Wolves Upset Apaches to Gain Prep Finals

RHEIN-MAIN. Germany (S&S) — Keeping the upset motif of the 1968 USDESEA basketball championships in vogue, the Wuerzburg Wolves shocked the top-seeded Augsburg Apaches, 57-52, here Friday night to gain the finals of the Class B tour-

The Wolves were matched against the Bitburg Barons, 62-49 conquerors of the Mannheim Bison, in the Class B finals, slated for Rhein-Main gym at 7 p.m. Saturday, preceding the Class A title showdown between Munich and Wiesbaden.

The Munich Mustangs and Wiesbaden Warriors gained their berths in the championship were to score. tussle by whipping Lakenheath's Lancer's, 70-68, and the Heidelberg Lions, 60-41, in the A semifinals, respectively.

It was Mannheim against Augsburg and Heidelberg against Lakenheath in the respective Class B and Class A third-place contests Saturday afternoon,

Augsburg apparently was on its way to its 14th straight win with a 36-27 advantage with 4:21 remaining in the third period. However, the Apaches reckoned without the will power of the Wolves and baskets by Tony Lopez, Bob Astarita, Mike Harrison and Ron Brown cut the advantage to one
