Unbeaten Bonn, 8-0, Thumps Raiders in Two

BONN (Special) — Bonn ran its unbeaten Western Division cage record to eight games over the weekend with a pair of wins over the American School of London.

The Crusaders shot 47 per cent from the floor both days to down the Raiders, 44-33 Friday and 44-32 Saturday.

Bonn led throughout Friday's game but found an eight-point

halftime lead cut to one point with five minutes to go in the fourth quarter. A key basket by reserve Mario Kosier got the Crusaders going again.

Mike DeSanto and Marc Westerhorstmann led Bonn with 15 and 14 points, respectively. Wolf Hahne scored just six points but grabbed 12 rebounds.

Steve Hall was the workhorse for ASL, 1-7, scoring 11 points and pulling down 10 rebounds.

The Crusaders outscored ASL, 17-4, in Saturday's second quarter to wipe out a first-quarter 14-10 deficit.

Westerhorstmann sparked the Bonn victory with 15 points and 10 rebounds. John Woodall led ASL with 11 points and nine rebounds.

Big Period Sparks Bucs' Twin Victory

AUGSBURG, Germany (Special) — The Baumholder Bucs hung on to their one-third possession of the Red Division lead here by taking a pair of verdicts from the Augsburg Apaches.

Baumholder, upping its record to 7-1, posted a 59-51 win Friday night and then came back to score a 93-54 victory Saturday on the strength of a spectacular 44-point third period. The Bucs share the league lead with Berlin and Zweibruecken who also recorded two wins over the weekend.

Larry Ford paced the Bucs in both games, getting 22 points in the opener and 26 on Saturday. Junior Garcia added 13 to Friday's cause. Mike Higgins was high for Augsburg on Friday with 15 while Herman Kunangai and Greg Coffing followed with 12 and 11, respectively.

Higgins was the only gun the Apaches had working on Saturday and he took game laurels with 33 points on 13 baskets and seven free throws. Junior Garcia and Rich Stock gave Ford solid support, Garcia pumping in 22-points to Stock's 18.

Baumholder held a 33-28 lead at intermission Saturday and it looked as if the game would be a repeat of Friday's close one. However, the Bucs displayed an awesome shooting ability in the next eight minutes, averaging five and one-half points a minute, to break things wide open.

Wildcats Stay Unbeaten With Two Triumphs

ROME (Special) — Coach Don Kjerstad's Naples Wildcats remained unbeaten in Italy League play by clubbing the Overseas School of Rome Falcons twice over the weekend.

Scoring 51 points in the second half, the Wildcats buried the Falcons, 71-18, in Friday's game. Saturday they went four points better with a 75-37 triumph.

Forward Tim Smith was the leading scorer in both games, canning 26 and 19 points, respectively. He only played half of the game Friday.

Greg Vidal tallied 13 Friday to follow up Smith while Bill Denbigh and Ray Neurich had 14 each Saturday.

Buster's FG Gives Eagles Victory, Split With Barons

NUERNBERG, Germany (Special) — Sam Buster's 16-foot set shot from the side with 21 seconds left gave the Nuernberg Eagles a 52-50 come-back win over Bitburg and a split of their weekend games with the Barons.

Bill Ausmus, with 23 points and 13 rebounds, led Bitburg to a 51-45 triumph Friday.

The split dropped Nuernberg, 6-2, two games behind unbeaten Heidelberg, 8-0, in the Blue Division standings. Bitburg is now 2-5.

Saturday, the Barons were ahead, 50-42, with 2:07 left when the Eagles mounted their successful rally.

First, Howard Williams con-

nected on a jumper from the key. Stan Hatcher was good from 16 feet out and Williams again hit on a jumper to put Bitburg within two, 50-48, with 1:14 remaining.

With 57 seconds left, Hatcher scored on a tip-in to knot the

score at 50-50, setting the stage for Buster's winning shot.

Hatcher and Williams paced the Eagles with 17 and 12 points, respectively. Buster came up with nine including the big one.

Sean Terry with 16 points, Al Forbes with 15 and Ausmus with 13 were Barons in double figures.

Friday, Buster gave Nuernberg a quick 2-0 lead. Ausmus countered on a short jumper and Forbes on a tip-in and 16-footer and the Barons were never again headed.

The Barons, led by Ausmus' 8-of-11 from the field, made good on 21 of 45 shots for a fine 46.7 percentage. The Eagles hit 19 of 56 for 33.9 per cent.

Ausmus was followed in the Bitburg scoring by Forbes with 14 points and Terry with 10.

Wally Knight led Nuernberg with 17 markers. Hatcher added 12 while pulling down 10 rebounds.



Cubs Dispose Of Bearkats, 76-23, 52-35

BAD KREUZNACH, Germany (Special) — Berlin, keeping abreast of its co-leaders in the Red Division, Zweibruecken and Baumholder, stung Bad Kreuznach twice to rir its record to 7-1.

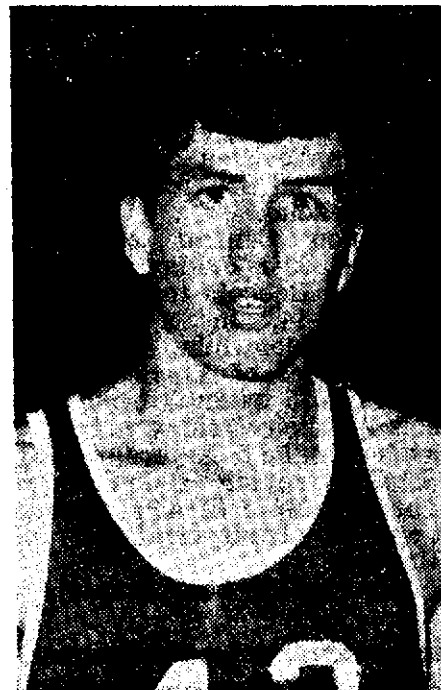
Green, Smith Lead Ankara Over Izmir

ANKARA, Turkey (Special) — Dave Green scored 40 points and Sam Smith sparked on defense here over the weekend as the Ankara Trojans took two games from the Izmir Sultans and moved into first place in the American Schools in Turkey League.

Green scored 25 points Friday as the Trojans posted a 77-67 victory in the scorebook. Smith limited Izmir's high scoring Tony Britton to one field goal in Saturday's 51-43 triumph.

Smith backed up Green with an 18-point performance on Friday and Gary Burkhart and Mike Kennedy came through with 13 and 12 points, respectively, for the winners. Britton seared the nets for 24 points to top Izmir. Larry Barton dialed 19.

Barton got 27 for the visitors on Saturday, so Smith's defensive effort on Britton, who had scored 11 field goals Friday, was the key factor in the Ankara win. Green paced Ankara with 15 points and Jim Graeser added 12.

MUNICH (Special) — Stuttgart's Eddie Vojensky and Munich's little David Iturralde staged a real scoring show over the weekend and broke exactly even in each game, but Vojensky's Stallions won a pair of Blue Division games.

ZWEIBRUECKEN, Germany (Special) — The Trojans of Zweibruecken won their sixth and seventh games of the season over the weekend to remain tied for the Red Division lead with Baumholder and Berlin.

Zweibruecken, receiving fine work on the boards from Mark Lauer, Jeff Cover and Larry Chestnut, pasted Bremerhaven's Blackhawks, 64-41, Friday. Saturday the Trojans won, 42-31, without the services of Lauer, who sustained a leg injury that may sideline him for two weeks.

The Blackhawks made the Trojans work for their victory Saturday. Dave Ganevsky kept Bremerhaven close in the first half with his scoring and playmaking. It took a steal and a lay-up by Plattenberger to give the Trojans a 21-19 halftime advantage.

After a technical was called on the Bremerhaven bench in the third period, the Trojans forced ahead by six, 32-26, on Chuck Shorette's goal from the corner and Chestnut's 20-foot jumper.

Zweibruecken hit 52 per cent Saturday to 14 for Bremerhaven.
