

Raiders win 2 from Barons, take Blue lead

BITBURG, Germany (Special) — The Kaiserslautern Red Raiders moved into undisputed first place in Blue Division basketball action here Friday and Saturday as they swept their series with the Bitburg Barons by scores of 47-34 and 64-49.

The two wins give the Raiders a 7-1 record and a one-game advantage over the Wiesbaden Warriors and the Heidelberg Lions. The Warriors, who had been tied with the Raiders at 5-1, split their weekend series with the Frankfurt Eagles to fall off

the pace. The pair of victories marked the return to action of Kaiserslautern's Jose Jackson who was playing in his first regular-season games after having been out with a broken leg. He celebrated his return by pacing the Raiders'

scoring for the two games with a total of 28 points. In Friday's game Karlton Hunt, who was high man for the Raiders, tallied eight of his 13 points in the first quarter as the visitors jumped into a 12-8 lead. The teams then battled on fairly

even turns to go into the final period with the Raiders ahead only 32-29 before they pulled away for the win.

Jackson, who hit for 18 points on Saturday, paced the opening period drive with six points as Kaiserslautern pulled ahead, 16-8. He added eight more markers in the final period as the Raiders won going away.

Sean Terry of Bitburg led both teams off the boards Saturday as he pulled down 12 rebounds against the taller visiting Raiders.

Hunt trailed Jackson in the scoring column Saturday with 14 markers while Scott Gilzean added 10 to the winning cause. Steve Jackson was high for Bitburg with 12 points and Mark Knotts and Steve Walls each added 10.

HEIDELBERG (Special) — The Heidelberg Lions pulled into a tie for second place in the Blue Division here over the weekend as they easily swept a pair of basketball games from the Nuernberg Eagles, 65-36 and 61-33. The Lions are now 6-2 in league

Munich, Wolves divide Red series

WUERZBURG, Germany (Special) — The Munich Mustangs were held to a split in two basketball contests with the Wuerzburg Wolves here Friday and Saturday but still managed to hold on to their share of the Red Division lead.

The Mustangs topped the Wolves, 51-37, in Friday's game but dropped the Saturday contest, 53-45, to lose an opportunity to take over sole possession of first place as the Berlin Cubs —

who went into the weekend with the same 5-1 mark as the Mustangs — also split their twin bill with the Augsburg Apaches.

Stallions take 2, keep hopes alive

STUTT GART, Germany (Special) — The Stuttgart Stallions kept their title hopes alive in the Blue Division over the weekend as they took a pair of home court victories from the Mannheim Bison, 60-48 and 70-63.

The wins gave the Stallions a 5-3 mark in league competition and tied them with the Frankfurt Eagles for fourth place — but still only two games behind the league-leading Kaiserslautern Red Raiders.

On Friday night the Stallions tallied 22 markers in the second period to take a 34-16 halftime

Equestrian body taps Steinkraus

NEW YORK (AP) — Bill Steinkraus, the only United States rider ever to win an Olympic individual jumping gold medal, has been named president of the U.S. Equestrian Team. Steinkraus replaces Whitney Stone, who resigned after holding the post for nearly 20 years. Stone will become chairman of the board. The action was taken at the U.S. Equestrian Team's directors' meeting. Steinkraus rode Snowbound to the gold medal at the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City and led the team to the silver medal in last year's Games at Munich, Germany. He retired as an active rider two months ago.
