

Red Division Action

Mannheim, Heidelberg Win, Share Crown

AUGSBURG, Germany, Nov. 7 (Special) — The Mannheim Lions nailed down a share of the Red Division championship by beating Augsburg Apaches, 12-6, here Saturday.

Mannheim and Heidelberg faced in a double tie for first place with 4-0-1 records. They played to a 6-6 tie earlier in the season.

The underdog Apaches trailed by only 6-0 at the half, following quarterback Dennis Borchert's first interception in the third period. The Blon made it 12-0 in the third quarter as fullback Don Jackson scored from two yards out.

Augsburg's TD came in the first stanza when Walt Garner scored on a 20-yard pass play from Frank Sherkey. Jim Yacovone, Clark Wockenwies and Manny Mora were defensive standouts for the Blon. Pete Bittenour, Tom Hartzel, Dave Peplis and Steve Heath were the big guns on defense for the Apaches.

The Apaches finished in third place in the Red Division with a 2-1 record.

SPANGDAHLER, Germany, Nov. 7 (Special) — The Mannheim Lions led the near-liaison conditions both their high-scoring offense here Saturday and their roared past the Bitburg Barons, 24-0, for their fourth straight win in the Red Division of the season.

The Lions tied for the Red Division championship with Mannheim, both teams compiling 4-0-1 records. Bitburg wound up

with a 1-3-1 mark.

Rolling to a 14-0 halftime lead, Heidelberg put its first two touchdowns on the scoreboard in the first quarter.

Heidelberg took the opening kickoff and started off on its own three-minute drive. After moving out to the 17, the Lions sent halfback Chip Cannon around right end and split back and he sprinted 83 yards to score. Fullback Tom Delaney then ran his first of five interceptions over.

Late in the second period the Lions found themselves backed deep in their own territory. Quarterback Bill Tryon, who hit on five of 11 passes for 142 yards, unlimbered his arm for the first time and lobbed a basket-

type loss to Rod Smith and the crowd then waited 15 yards on punt. A block by halfback Mike Devall cleared the way for him. Smith set up Heidelberg's only score of the third period by running 30 yards to the Bitburg four. The Lions scored twice in the final quarter, with Tryon's two touchdowns setting up both touchdowns.

Tryon ran his first interception back 80 yards and Cannon collected the TD on a six-yard play. Tryon's second theft resulted in a 40-yard run-back, and the quarterback was intercepted on a touchdown pass to Cannon.

Bitburg's only score was sandwiched between the two Lion

touchdowns in the final quarter. The offense was freshman quarterback Mike Barnhill and halfback Tony Alvin combined on a 50-yard run in the play.

Tryon's two touchdown passes used his total time to nine for the season. He finished the year with 45 completions in 61 attempts, good for over 600 yards.

The three touchdowns Cannon scored raised his point total for the year to 78. He also led Heidelberg in rushing this season with 484 yards on 96 carries.

Despite the snow-covered field and below-freezing temperature, Heidelberg gained 400 yards on offense. The Barons were held to 44 on the ground and 88 through the air.

BAUMHOLZ, Germany, Nov. 7 (Special) — The Wuerzburg Wolves wound up their 1965 season by taking a 14-0 victory over the Mannheim Barons in the final game of the season.

The Eagles opened scoring, driving 65 yards with Mark Norman's three-yard run reaching quarterback Harold Hardman run for the two-point.

The key gainer on the march was a twisting 47-yard run by Bruce Capps.

The Stallions bolted right back as Bill Park passed to James Taylor for touchdowns in the first play after the kickoff, the pass-run going 53 yards. Bob Stanton's two-point plunge tied the game, 8-8.

From there on, neither team could drive, although Ludwigwigbur had one push interrupted at the Eagle 19 by a blocked punt.

The Families thwarted both teams in the third stanza. Brilliant defensive efforts were turned in by Ludwigwigbur's Twomey and Nuernberg's Ted Hedrick, as the game was played in cold, windy, rain-swept weather on a snow-covered field.

Also outstanding defensively for the Stallions were Paul Thorne and Don Harmon, while Hardman was a key man for the Eagles.

Offensively, the two teams were very even, with Nuernberg scoring a touchdown and the Eagles gained 156 on the ground to 70 for the Stallions, but 125 versus 100 in the air.

Stallions Deadlock Nuernberg, 8-8, on 53-Yard TD Play

LUDWIGSBURG, Germany, Nov. 7 (Special) — Nuernberg and Ludwigwigbur traded first-period touchdowns in a deadlock, evening the rest of the way in an 8-8 homecoming standoff in the U.S. National League.

The Eagles, who wound up in the cellar, nearly pulled out their first loop victory after four losses, driving to the two-yard line in the final period. With first and goal at that point, the Stallions dug in and stopped four line thrusts cold to preserve the tie.

The Stallions (1-1) made one last desperate try, with Kerl Thorne locked from behind on the Eagle 35-yard line, completing a 49-yard pass play as the game wound.

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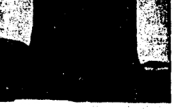
Kats Hand Karlsruhe 26-14 Loss

Stofa threw 27 touchdowns passes in seven games at Lakeland, Fla., to the North Florida League championship this season.

Stofa, 24 years old, 6-foot-1 and weighing 210 pounds, had been with the Dolphins' roster after training camp. Then he played exhibition games with the Pittsburgh Steelers when out by them, he joined Lakeland.

400 See Clay Spar in Abbreviated Workout

HOUSTON, Nov. 6 (AP) — Cassius Clay sparred Saturday with light-heavyweight Jim M. Eells of Louisville, Ky., Sunday in an abbreviated workout for the heavyweight champ's title meeting Nov. 14 with Cleveland White of Houston.

A crowd of more than 400 jammed a walk-up downtown gym to watch Clay shadow box, skip rope and go against the

fast-punching Eells. Clay crouched on the footlock and defending jabs in the first round.

The first of the daily workouts Saturday was free at Clay's insistence. The second was for spectators a dollar apiece, with the gate going to the Harris County Public Schools for the 1964-65 Spacecraft Center. Clay refused a football game here Saturday.

Kerr Records Perfect Ride In Pentathlon

MELBOURNE, Australia, Nov. 6 (UPI) — Jim Kerr of the United States was among eight competitors who completed the grueling ride phase of the Modern Pentathlon World Championship without one penalty point Sunday.

Kerr had a time of three minutes 47 seconds on the 1,500-meter, 20-obstacle course at Yarraglen to receive the bronze medal and a 1:00 penalty phase of the five-sport competition.

Other penalty-free riders were David Barclay of Mexico, Julian Guiguet of France, Bjornern Fern of Sweden, Peter Gerden of West Germany, Albert Shaparinov of Russia and Fredo Balzoc of France.

James Coates of the U.S. was timed in 3:34 with 80 faults for 140 points and Chris Coates of 4:18 with 160 faults and 785 points.
