

# Wisconsin Surrenders to Ga.; Wants Expansion Consideration

MADISON, Wis., Oct. 11 (AP) — Bu chail's disputed Braves were conceded to Atlanta Tuesday as the Braves' new home. The U.S. Supreme Court is to try to restore the sport to Milwaukee through National League expansion.

The surrender to the South came in a vague footnote of the 18-page appeal. But the state asked the nation's highest court to settle the legal battle over the Braves' move.

Wisconsin Atty. Gen. Bronson C. La Follette asked the Supreme Court to overturn a state court ruling that baseball's traditional immunity from federal antitrust law also shielded it from state law against monopolies.

A state circuit court Judge in

Milwaukee found the national League guilty of state antitrust violations last April and ordered the Braves' removal from Atlanta unless plans were submitted.

## Soccer Czar Predicts U.S. Acceptance

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 11 (UPI)—Sir George Graham of Scotland, acting Executive Director of the National Professional Soccer League (NPSL), said here today that the United States "will go straight to the top in popularity."

Graham arrived in St. Louis to open the new league's office. He was recently named to the soccer post.

Sir George said that league play would begin the first Sunday next April, in a news conference at the St. Louis Press club. Sir George said "there's no copyright on soccer."

I expect that our league will eventually be sanctioned by the International Soccer Football Association (ISFA).

However, La Follette said, "Wisconsin is now asking only that Milwaukee be included in expansion plans for the league."

The obscure footnote on the 13th page of the appeal simply noted that the suit "originally alleged that Braves should be returned to their former home in Milwaukee, and added the Braves' bid on grounds of state law in the 4-3 decision July 27.

Only issues involving federal law can be argued before the U. S. Supreme Court.

In the two sentences of the footnote, Atlanta was a year-long courtroom tug-of-war with Milwaukee that ended with an estimated half a million dollars in legal fees. The Wisconsin surrender means should keep its Braves through 1969 under their present contract, but long after that as the club likes.

Still at stake for baseball, however, is an even more far-reaching issue, that of the ban on antitrust laws which which the sport has citing for 44 years.

In an astonishing turn of events in the appeal, Wisconsin placed in peril the very fabric of baseball, as it would attack the cities where it wants to play and its iron-clad contract control over the sport.

Asks for State Authority Wisconsin asked the Supreme Court to grant a hearing on its plea that the state be permitted to force its own antitrust laws against the National League and its 10 clubs and to compel the league to return baseball to Milwaukee.

Four of the nine justices must agree to return the case before it can be heard.

"Sometime in December, I think would be an optimistic prediction" for that decision, La Follette said at a news conference at Madison, Wis.

If the Supreme Court does decide to accept the case, a hearing would be unlikely before the next spring. La Follette said next June would be a "reasonable calculated guess" on the date for a final decision.

## Newspaper Writer Repeats as Senior Gals' Golf Champ

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 11 (AP) — Golfing writer Maureen Orcutt of the New York Times won the U.S. Senior Women's Amateur Golf championship for the second time here, firing a five-over par 74 in a three-day event.

Trailing by four strokes after the opening round, Miss Orcutt led a one-stroke lead the second day with a 74.

Miss Orcutt shot a birdie 20 on No. 4 in the finale and was at par over the last 10 holes on the back nine at Lakewood Country Club. Her front nine score was a two-over par 39 and she covered the back nine in three-over par 46.

Her closest rival was Mrs. Frank Goldwithie of Fort Worth, Tex., with a 248. She had a three-over par 39 and ended the day with a 80.

Mrs. Glenn Collett Vard of New Haven, Pa., finished third with 250.
