NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—Six National League players and four American Leaguers have been named to the Topps major league all star rookie baseball team on a vote of 585 players, managers and coaches.

The National League placed shortstop Sonny Jackson of Houston, third baseman Tommy Helms of Cincinnati, outfielders Clyde Jones of New York and Byron Browne of the Chicago Cubs, catcher Randy Hundley of the Cubs and left-handed pitcher Woody Fryman of Pittsburgh.

The American Leaguers on the team are first baseman George Scott of Boston; second baseman Dave Johnson of Baltimore, outfielder Tommy Agee of Chicago and right-handed pitcher Jim Nash of Kansas City.

## Mele Lost Respect of Team—Kaat

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 18 (UPI) Minnesota Twins pitcher Jim Kaat said Monday that Manager Sam Mele lost the respect of a majority of his players through a breakdown in communications with them and two of his coaches.

Kaat, a 25-game winner in 1966, held a news conference at club President Calvin Griffith after they had met concerning Kaat's open letter Oct. 5 in which he called the coach a pitching coach Johnny Sain a mistake.

A rift between Mele and Sain developed in mid-season of 1965 and grew worse this year. At the conclusion of the 1968 season, Mele went to Griffith to ask him to give Sain and bullpen coach Hal Naragon their releases. Both have since been hired by the Detroit Tigers.

### Must Take Charge

"Whether you like a manager or not, you must take charge, and respect him if he takes charge. A lack of communications has cost Sam some things. However, I think respect can be patched up."

Kaat said he wrote his open letter to spike rumors that there was dissension on the team and that some players followed one coach and other players another coach.

The rift reportedly occurred in mid-season of 1965 when he had base coach Bill Martin and Sain had a run-in about Martin criticizing a pitcher. Sain expressed disappointment that he had not helped him in his battle with Martin.

### Moves With Players

Sain then moved out of the coaching room and took a locker with the players.

Kaat said he chose to use the open letter method of raising Sain rather than going to Griffith because he was afraid there would be "distorted" news headlines if a private meeting was held.

In his letter, Kaat had said if he was ever appointed a general manager he would offer Sain a blank contract and then hire a manager that could take advantage of his talents.

"I was only using a hypothetical situation," Kaat said. "I want to know how Sain is the best pitching coach anywhere. I wasn't faulting Sam."
