DANKFURT, Germany, Oct. 3 (S&S)—The 46-13 victory Wiesbaden posted over Ramstein's Rams on Sunday stretched the Flyer win streak to 18 games, and not 15 as reported in The Stars and Stripes.  
The USAFE record for consecutive games without a loss is 29, set by the London Rockets in 1954-55-56.  
The Flyers, beales in their season finale in 1964 by Rhein-Main, reeled off 11 straight triumphs on their way to the 1965 USAFE championship. Sunday's victory was their fifth in the 1966 season.

**Hodgdon's TD Shots Fire Frankfurt Past Outclassed Bobcats**

FRANKFURT, Oct. 3 (S&S)—Hodgdon's Matt Hodgdon fired three touchdown passes and ran for another — all over 20 yards by most accounts — the Frankfurt High Eagles outclassed the London Bobcats, 43-9, for a straight six-straight exhibition triumph here Saturday.  
Coach Bob Moss' Eagles looking like the team to beat in the Blue Division which gets under way next Saturday, scored in every quarter and didn't allow the Bobcats inside the Frankfurt 22-yard line.  
With no less than 11 backs getting a chance to log the leather, the Eagles rolled up 218 yards on the ground. They added 68 more through the air with all three of Hodgdon's pass completions going for TDs.  
Frankfurt's offense could not be wrong, but its defense looked even better as the Bobcats

could manage only two yards on 18 running plays and 85 yards on 8-for-20 from the firing line.  
While the likes of center Bob North, tight end Steve Alcorn and tackle Ron Causeaux were keeping the Bobcats out of Frankfurt territory throughout the exhibition, the Eagles breezed to a 27-0 lead.  
The Eagles picked up 15 points in the first quarter, with the first two coming on a safety, End Ren

lener tackled John Hickman, who caught an Eagle fumble in the end zone, for the two points.  
Flashy halfback Les Ashby who scored two touchdowns and paced the Eagles' ground attack with 64 yards on six carries, hung onto a 36-yard pass from Hodgdon for six more points on Frankfurt's third play following the Bobcat kickoff. Ashby also booted the extra point but then missed three in a row.  
Hodgdon's 27 yards to Sonny Delgado on the final play of the first quarter to make it 27-0.  
Frankfurt returned a fumble recovery by Glen Imobersteg and a 36-yard pass from Hodgdon into the end zone for the final TD late in the second stanza. Joe Caldwell scored 10 yards on a 10-yard run and Steve Ashby added 10 yards to pay dirt on the first play following the kicker's scores.  
Randy end M Ike Schanzler teamed with Bob Baker to boot the extra point for a TD late in the third period and then caught a 36-yard pass from Hodgdon to share with Smith for the extra points.

Hodgdon completed the rout, going 20 yards on the final play of the game for a TD. Steve Smith skipped through the Bobcat line for two more markers. London moved into Frankfurt territory for the first time with two minutes left in the quarter. Gene Miller hit Jim Andujar on passes that went for 19 and 27 yards and moved the Bobcats to the Eagles' 20 that drive, the visitors' best of the exhibition, ended with Caldwell's tying 30-yard pass.
