

Michigan nips Navy, 21-16

set. Both teams are now 2-1. Pagnanelli moved Navy 94 yards and scrambled 22 yards on a broken play as the third quarter ended to pull his team within 8 points, 21-13.

Pagnanelli, who completed 7 passes in a row in the second half, moved his team from its own 34 to the Michigan 28 before its next drive fizzled out and Steve Fehr kicked a 45-yard field goal, his third of the game. In the second quarter he had kicks of 46 and 31 yards.

The Wolverines were unable to move again and the Middies went from their own 29 to the Wolverines' 23 before the Michigan defense came up with its first sack of the game to put Navy back on the 31. Middle guard Doug James dropped Pagnanelli trying to pass on fourth down at the 38 and Michigan ran out the clock. The Wolverines intercepted Pagnanelli trying to throw from his own end zone with just seconds to go.

The Michigan defense did not give Navy a first down until 2:26 remained in the first half. Fehr kicked his second field goal with 32 seconds left to make it 14-6 at halftime.

Butch Woolfolk gained 117 yards in 25 rushes, becoming only the third Michigan back to have five consecutive 100-yard games, and capped his team's second possession with a 4-yard TD run.

Michigan marched 66 yards the next time it had the ball and Smith ran the final 2 yards to give the Wolverines a 14-0 lead.

Smith, who only had a 21 percent completion ratio for his first two starts, completed his first seven passes. Carter caught three for 50 yards but no touchdowns and left the field with a sprained ankle early in the second quarter.

The Wolverines came out the second time they had the ball and turned an interception by Evan Cooper on the Navy 34 into their third touchdown when Smith passed 8 yards to Bean. Pagnanelli's pass was tipped by Tim Jackson and Cooper plucked it out of the air to set up the score.

Michigan's tough defense held the Midshipmen without a first down until Navy tailback Nap McCallum finally slashed 13 yards to the Navy 44 with 2:33 remaining in the second quarter.

However, Pagnanelli, a 6-foot, 210-pound sophomore from Huntington Beach, Calif., rallied the Midshipmen in the second half and forced the Michigan defense to stay on the field for long periods of time when the Wolverines' offense bogged down.

Pagnanelli finished with 48 yards on nine carries while completing nine of 16 pass attempts for another 96 yards, with one interception. Smith completed 10 of 15 for 110 yards, with one interception.

Woolfolk, the fleet 6-2, 210-pound senior from Westfield, N.J., finished with 117 yards on 25 carries and moved into eighth place tie with Harlan Huckleby on the Wolverines alltime touchdown list with 25.

Miss. State 28, Florida 7

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Michael Haddix, Mississippi State's leading rusher carried only three times in the first half Saturday but scored on runs of 10 and 2 yards after perfect pitchouts from quarterback John Bond and the 12th-ranked Bulldogs went on to gain a sloppily played 28-7 Southeastern Conference football victory over Florida.

Glen Young, the nation's leading punt returner, iced the game with a 49-yard return of Joe Borajkiewicz's kick at 11:56 of the third quarter. Young had a 100-yard kickoff return wiped out by a clipping penalty just after Wayne Peace threw a 6-yard touchdown pass to Spencer Jackson with 2:47 left in the second period, putting the Gators within 14-7 at halftime.

And the Bulldogs finally avenged their only SEC loss of 1980, one which cost them a trip to the Sugar Bowl, when Dennis Zinnimon blocked a Borajkiewicz punt and Bobby Junkin returned it 3 yards for a touchdown with 5:55 left in the game.

The regionally televised contest between two of the SEC's top teams was filled with turnovers and penalties. Florida lost the ball five times on interceptions and once on a fumble on the game's first play that set up a Mississippi State touchdown.

North Carolina 56, Boston College 14

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — Tailback Kelvin Bryant scored four touchdowns and quarterback Rod Elkins passed for three more as unbeaten and ninth-ranked North Carolina crushed Boston

College 56-14 in a non-conference college football game Saturday.

A crowd of 48,000 watched as Bryant raised his season's touchdown total to 15. He scored on runs of 2, 2, 4 and 39 yards.

With eight games remaining, Bryant needs six touchdowns to tie the Atlantic Coast Conference record of 21 set in 1970 by the Tar Heels' Don McCauley. In three games he is more than half-way to the NCAA season record of 29 touchdowns set by Lydell Mitchell of Penn State in 1971.

Bryant, the nation's leading scorer, carried the ball 22 times for 173 yards.

Elkins, who was shaken up on a run in the second quarter, completed 4 of 8 passes for 89 yards. He threw touchdown passes of 8 and 10 yards to Victor Harrison and a 63-yarder to Mark Smith.

Elkins had a fourth touchdown pass called back when he released the ball beyond the line of scrimmage.

Boston College scored its two touchdowns through the air, one in the second quarter on a 19-yard completion from Dennis Scalla to Brian Brennan. The other came late in the fourth quarter on a 20-yarder from Doug Guyer to tight end Brian Krystoforski.

The regionally televised victory raises the Tar Heels' record to 3-0, while dropping the Eagles to 1-1.

Georgia 24, South Carolina 0

ATHENS, Ga. (AP) — All-American tailback Heraldo Walker pounded out 176 yards and scored two touchdowns Saturday as the 17th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs rebounded from their first defeat in 22 months to overwhelm South Carolina 24-0 in college football.

Georgia, 3-1, which lost to Clemson 13-3 last Saturday to snap its 15-game winning streak, erupted for three second-half touchdowns after managing only a 3-0 edge at intermission on freshman Kevin Butler's 22-yard field goal.

Walker, however, broke loose for scoring runs of 3 and 8 yards only 5:41 apart in the third period to break the game open. Quarterback Buck Belue added a 28-yard TD strike to Norris Brown, who was alone in the end zone midway through the final period, to close out the scoring.

South Carolina, 2-2, managed only 117 yards and six first downs until the final five minutes as the tough Georgia defense recorded its second shutout in four games.

Walker, who ran the ball 36 times and now has 615 yards for the season, capped an 80-yard drive when he blasted up the middle from three yards out to give the Bulldogs a 10-0 lead with 8:52 gone in the third quarter.

The 6-foot-2, 220-pound sophomore then scored on a sweep around left end with 27 seconds remaining in the period, capping a 47-yard drive set up when linebacker Nate Taylor intercepted a Terry Bishop pass.

South Carolina's only scoring opportunity came early in the second half after Troy Thomas returned a punt 54 yards to the Georgia 24. The Bulldogs stiffened, however, and a 35-yard field goal attempt by Mark Fleetwood failed wide left.

Georgia missed two scoring opportunities in the opening half when Belue gave up the ball twice to the Gamecocks.

After Dale Williams intercepted a Gordon Beckham pass at the Georgia 45, the Bulldogs moved to the 29 before Belue's fumble was recovered by defensive end Phil Ellis with 9:32 left before intermission.

Following an exchange of punts, Georgia moved from its own 10 to South Carolina's 41 before Belue was intercepted by Pat Bowen on the 29-yard line.

Walker now has 2,231 yards in 16 games, only 350 shy of the school career record of 2,581 set by Kevin McLee from 1975-77.

Bitburg 13, Osterholz 12

BITBURG, Germany — Bitburg's George Peterson hit Mark Booth with a 26-yard scoring pass with 38 seconds to go, then the Bitburg defense stopped Osterholz's Tyrone Foster short on a PAT run with time expired as the Barons pulled out a 13-12 victory here Saturday in a rainy, windy Germany AA North football opener.

After Peterson's TD pass to Booth, Osterholz quarterback Tom Buford combined with Bobby Williams and Foster on the old pass and lateral play covering 62 yards for a touchdown as time ran out.

Buford's pass was for seven yards where Williams made the catch at the Osterholz 45, then lateralled off to Foster who raced down the sidelines for the score that gave Osterholz a chance to win the game.

On the PAT run, Blackhawk tailback Foster was stopped at the line of scrimmage to preserve the Barons' victory.

Williams had returned a pass interception 89 yards early in the final quarter to tie the score.

Bitburg's winning TD drive was set in motion by Dave Davis's fumble recovery at the Osterholz 35 in a rain-plagued game and 25 mile-an-hour winds. Booth made a leaping grab between two defenders on the scoring play, then twisted away for the final two yards as Bitburg took a 12-6 lead.

What turned out to be the winning point was kicked by Don Wible with 38 seconds to go.

Another fumble recovery, by Mike Wing, set up Bitburg's first TD, in the second quarter, the Barons driving 45 yards, capped by a 14-yard swing pass from Peterson to Labanson Coffey for the score.

Defensive stars for the winners include Wing, Shawn Kelley, Davis and Coffey, who recovered 3 fumbles. Top Osterholz defenders were June Brown, Johnny Christmas and Joe Deck.

ISB 6, Hahn 0

HAHN, Germany — David Webb pounced on a fumble early in the first period to carry the ISB Raiders to a 6-0 verdict over the Hahn Hi-Hawks in a Benenor Conference football game here Saturday.

The triumph enabled the Raiders to keep their unbeaten string intact at 3-0. Hahn is still looking for its first victory after three games.

Hahn elected to receive the opening

kick but fumbled at its own 33 where the Raiders recovered. ISB then marched to the 1 where the drive stalled on downs.

Hahn tried to grind its way out of the muddy field but on second down, tailback Tony Daniels fumbled and Webb recovered for the game's only score.

The Hi-Hawks tried to pull the game out late in the fourth period, but the clock ran out with Hahn on the ISB 20.

Don Tuttle ran through the rain for 70 ISB yards to lead both offenses in the defense-oriented game. Bret Funke picked up 42 yards on 23 carries for the losers.

Webb, a defensive end, and Paul Rothaug at defensive tackle keyed the Raider defense. Defensive ends Rob Valentine and Les Brown, linebacker Dave Worner and Jim Tobey at nose guard anchored the Hi-Hawks' defense.

Wuerzburg 21, Karlsruhe 16

KARLSRUHE, Germany — The Wuerzburg Wolves rallied from behind with 21 points in the third quarter to knock off the Karlsruhe Knights, 21-16, in a non-conference high school game here Saturday.

The Wolves, now 3-0, trailed 10-0 at the half.

Brussels 60, AFCENT 0

BRUNSSUM, the Netherlands — Dave Hassing scored four times, Jeff Ward added two TDs and Hassan Aden recovered a blocked punt for one tally and added a tackle for a safety as Brussels ran

roughshod over AFCENT 60-0 here Saturday in Benenor football action.

Hassing scored on runs of 8 and 14 yards and caught TD passes of 76 and 30 yards from quarterback Robert Banks. Ward's scores came on runs of 20 and 7 yards. Kevin Banks, who ran for 102 yards, had one 11-yarder for another Brussels tally.

Brussels' kicker Dave Roe added a 30-yard field goal and booted seven PATs in eight tries to account for the other 10 points amassed by the winners.

The victory extended the Brigands' longest-in-Europe winning streak to 12 in which they have scored 345 points to only 27 by their opponents. Only three teams have scored on the Brigands in that span.

The winners rolled up 277 yards rushing and 172 passing while holding the home team to a minus 43 yards total offense. The Brussels defense permitted the Lions 38 yards passing but sacked AFCENT 13 times for a minus 133 yards.

Hassing, besides his 79 yards rushing and five pass receptions for 125 yards, had 17 tackles including two sacks from his linebacker position. Aden, playing end on defense, had 11 tackles including his safety plus one blocked punt recovery for his TD.

Ward added eight tackles at a linebacker spot to his 67 yards rushing and two pass catches for 29 yards, and Bill Harvey had 7 stops.

Brussels is 3-0 in league play this year while dropping AFCENT to 1-2.
