

# Party Picks Sadat for Egypt Chief

CAIRO (AP) — Acting President Anwar Sadat was unanimously nominated for the presidency Monday by the eight-man executive committee of Egypt's ruling party.

In an official statement of the Arab Socialist Union, its executive committee recommended to the party's central committee of 150 that the National Assembly meet Tuesday in the form of a steering committee and Wednesday in a formal session to endorse the nomination of Sadat.

A nationwide referendum — giving voters a yes-or-no option — was recommended for Oct. 15, with the president to be sworn in two days later.

Sadat became interim president when President Gamal Abdel Nasser died a week ago.

# Troops Arrive For Reforger

Grenadier Brigade, will join with two brigades of the USAR-EUR-based 3rd Inf Div as aggressor forces to oppose the 1st Div's two arriving brigades, plus the 3rd Brigade stationed at Augsburg, in "Certain Thrust", a field training exercise.

All told, some 16,000 Germany-based U.S. troops and 3,000 Bundeswehr troops will join the 11,000 arrivals from the United States for the exercise, due to be held Oct. 19-23 between Bamberg and Grafenwoehr.

Although Reforger II is not considered a test of speed or rapid response, the movement of troops — plus 500 tons of airlift equipment and supplies in support — is scheduled to be completed nine days faster than the January 1969 airlift of Reforger I.

## Go to Depots

The troops arriving over the next six days from the U.S. will move by road and rail transport to receive prepositioned equipment at depots in Karlsruhe, Kaiserslautern and Mannheim, then move to a tactical assembly area near Sinsheim by Oct. 13.

By Oct. 18, they will redeploy to an assembly area between Bamberg and Kitzingen in preparation for Certain Thrust the following day.

Following completion of the field exercise, there will be test-firing of tank and artillery weapons at Grafenwoehr Oct. 24-28.

The U.S.-based units are scheduled to leave from Nuernberg for seven days beginning Oct. 29, with rear elements flying out of Rhein-Main Nov. 6-24.

sleeping pills, the autopsy surgeon said, and no evidence of injury or violence.

Police ordered an autopsy after saying they found needle marks on her left arm.

"It didn't look like foul play," said an ambulance attendant who removed the nightgown-clad body Sunday night. "It looked like she had just fallen over."

Miss Joplin had come here from her San Francisco home to record for Columbia, which had sold millions of her singles "Piece of My Heart," "Maybe," "One Good Man" and albums "Cheap Thrills," "I Got Them Ol' Kozmic Blues Again, Mama."

Her body was found by her guitarist, John Cooke, who wondered why the singer had not emerged from her hotel apartment all day Sunday, and borrowed a key to enter. He summoned police.

She had been dead approximately 12 hours, police said. Bottles of tequila, vodka and wine were found in the apartment, but no drugs.

Her drinking capacity was legendary. She drank liquor by the quart while onstage, but she tapered off as her career progressed.

Miss Joplin followed in death another member of the rock pantheon, Jimi Hendrix, 27, who was found in a London apart-

ment last month, having suffocated on vomit while unconscious.

"People seem to have a high sense of drama about me," Janis Joplin once told an interviewer. "Maybe they can enjoy my music more if they think I'm destroying myself."

"I got into this because of something inside me. I'm not one of those people with a learned skill. If I'm going to do it I'm going to do it for real. I can't just go out on stage and fake it. I've got to let loose with what's inside."

Her galvanic style brought her the title "the Judy Garland of rock." She bore a resemblance to the previous star in her full-voiced style, her complete openness with an audi-

ence, and talk of self-destruction. Miss Garland died in a London apartment in 1969, apparently from a drug overdose.

Born in Port Arthur, Tex., in 1943, Janis Joplin was a rebel at 17, drifted across the country, taking odd jobs and occasional college courses. She came to admire beatniks because they "believe things aren't going to get better and say the hell with it, stay stoned and have a good time."

Fame overtook her at the 1967 Monterey Pop Festival. She had been singing in small clubs in San Francisco and Los Angeles, developing a mournful blues style that harked back to her early idols, Huddie "Leadbelly" Ledbetter and Bessie Smith.

At Monterey she astounded

the huge audience with her vibrant style and depth of feeling on "Love Is Like a Ball and Chain." Her success was made.

Once she analyzed her style: "Black people have the blues because they can't have this and they can't have that. Me, I was brought up in a middle-class family; I could have had anything. But you need something more in your gut, man."

After Monterey came the trappings of superstardom — the shrieking crowds, constant travel, occasional brushes with the law over obscene language onstage. Janis Joplin was rich, but she still lived like a hippie in a cluttered San Francisco apartment.

Although she seemed totally fulfilled as an artist before the audience, she admitted that the rest of her life was wanting.

"The worst thing is the loneliness," she told an interviewer last year. "Somehow you lose all the old friends. The travel circumstances pull them away."

"It's hard to make new ones. When we're not onstage, we rehearse, lay around in bed, check in and out of motels, watch television. It really is lonely. I live for that one hour on stage. It's full of feeling. It's more exciting than you'd expect in a lifetime. It's a rush, honey."

# Iraq Orders Death For Hashish Smuggler

BAGHDAD (AP)—Iraq's revolutionary court has handed down the first death sentence for hashish smuggling in the country's history.

The convicted smuggler is a Lebanese, Khatter Tanyus, who was found guilty of smuggling 26 kilograms of the drug to Iraq last month.

Another Lebanese was sentenced to life imprisonment with hard labor. Iraq made narcotics smuggling punishable by death last year.

# British Trade Official Is Kidnaped in Montreal

MONTREAL (UPI) — A French Canadian separatist group abducted the senior British trade commissioner at the point of submachine guns Monday in Canada's first diplomatic kidnaping.

They demanded in an eight-page letter addressed to news media and police, a half-million dollars in gold, the release of some jailed separatists and safe passage on a plane to Cuba, police said.

Four men forced their way into the elegant downtown home of James R. Cross — the equivalent of the British consul in Montreal — and hustled him away in a taxi.

Credit for the kidnaping was claimed by the Front de Liberation Quebecois (FLQ), an underground group which aims at forcing the separation of French-speaking Quebec from English Canada.

The ransom demands were relayed to the federal government in Ottawa, but there was no immediate indication to whether the terms would be met. A government spokesman said earlier that Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau called together his top advisers in "an urgent session" when the kidnaping was revealed.

The four men — three with submachine guns and the other with a revolver — appeared about 8:20 a.m. at the door of the Cross home in an expensive

residential area on the slopes of Mount Royal, overlooking downtown Montreal, police said.

They told the maid who answered the door they had brought a gift for Cross, who celebrated his 49th birthday only six days earlier.

## Forced Way In

They then forced their way in, police said.

There were no shots fired and Cross did not resist. "It would have been hard for him to do, looking into three machine guns and a pistol," a police spokesman said.

They hustled Cross into a taxi and sped off.

Police set up roadblocks on all bridges leading off Montreal Island, and dispatched officers to guard other diplomats in Montreal. In Ottawa, External Affairs Minister Mitchell Sharp said "added steps" were taken to protect diplomats there.

"I'm going to do," Manson said.

"What are you going to do?" Older asked angrily, staring down at the bearded hippie cult leader.

"Mr. Manson, I'm going to have you removed if you do not stop," the judge said.

"I'm going to have you removed if you don't stop," Manson said, "I have a little system of my own."

## Jump Over Table

At that Manson sprang from his seat and literally dived across the table toward the judge's bench. The courtroom broke into pandemonium as deputies hurtled the railing in the middle of the courtroom and other jumped over the table to get at the defendant.

As Manson was led from the courtroom, he shouted:

"You think I'm kidding. In the name of Christian justice, I'm going to cut your head off."

Before the explosive action Monday by Manson the state had hoped to put on the witness stand a woman who blew open the Tate murder case after talking to Miss Atkins in a woman's jail.

Virginia Graham told authorities after Miss Atkins allegedly confided the weird story while both were being held in jail on other charges in November 1969, three months after the mass slayings.
