Scores Die In Severe Chile Quake

SANTIAGO, Chile—A violent earthquake in central Chile killed 66 persons, injured 317, and left thousands homeless, the government announced Friday. Thousands of others were without electricity, drinking water and telephones. Landslides isolated some communities in the quake that struck 57 minutes before midnight Thursday. (Photo on Page 3.) Interior minister Jose Toha announced the casualty figures in a nationwide radio and television speech. He called the earthquake a "true catastrophe." Reports from Chilean newsmen in cities shaken by the quake indicated the final toll of dead and injured could be much higher.

Four central provinces, in which about half of Chile's nine million inhabitants live, were declared emergency zones. The armed forces assumed temporary control of them.

President Salvador Allende visited the hardest-hit areas in a helicopter.

McCloskey Will Enter Primary

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Rep. Paul N. McCloskey Jr., the most outspoken Republican critic of President Nixon's Vietnam war policies, announced Friday he will enter the 1972 California presidential primary election "pledged to ending the war conditioned only upon return of the prisoners of war."

"This will not be a single issue campaign," the San Mateo, Calif., congressman said in a statement issued in advance of a news conference. "We seek in addition to ending the war to restore truth in government, to achieve a return to historic Republican moral commitment on social issues rather than the present 'Southern strategy' and a restoration of judicial excellence and independence."

McCloskey, 43, thus formally undertook a campaign he said he would launch only if Nixon failed to change his Indochina policy and if no other prominent Republican entered the race as a peace candidate.

Answering questions, the San Mateo, Calif., congressman said he has two major tasks. The first, he said, is to campaign and win in New Hampshire's first-in-the-nation primary (Cont. on Page 28, Col. 4)

Lockheed Guarantee Vital To Economy, Says Treasury

WASHINGTON — Treasury Under Secretary Charles E. Walker said Friday a \$250 million loan guarantee by the government to Lockheed Aircraft Corp. is vital to the nation's economy.

Walker told the Senate Banking Committee the Treasury supports a proposal now before the committee to provide up to \$2 billion in loan guarantees to financially ailing corporations, but he said approval of the Lockheed guarantee is essential no matter what is decided about the broader legislation.

The proposed \$2 billion loan guarantee proposal was put forward as a substitute for a bill aimed specifically at helping Lockheed avert bankruptcy.

"Most important is the avoidance of the blow to confidence which a Lockheed failure surely would produce," Walker said. "At this stage of a promising and broad-based economic recovery, the maintenance of confidence is the highest priority."

Walker asked the committee to separate the Lockheed loan from the larger proposal.

"The Lockheed situation has already been intensively reviewed by this committee and time is a critical element in effectively assisting this enterprise," he said.

Walker also said that if the committee decided to include in an overall bill a provision to allow Congress to veto loan guarantee proposals, "we

would strongly urge that such procedures be waived for the Lockheed guarantee."

Rock Singer Jim Morrison Dies of Heart Attack at 27

PARIS—American rock star Jim Morrison, 27, leader of The Doors, died unexpectedly from a heart attack last Saturday and was buried secretly in the historic Pere Lachaise Cemetery in a funeral arranged by his girl friend, police said Friday.


Police said Morrison was discovered unconscious in the bathroom of his chic apartment Saturday morning by Pamela Courson, 25, of Los Angeles, the singer's companion for the last five years.

"Miss Courson said when Morrison woke up last Saturday, he was not feeling well. He asked her to get a bath ready and then entered the bathroom. Not hearing any noise, Miss Courson later opened the door to find Morrison lying unconscious in the bath," a police officer said.

The officer at the precinct for the Fourth Arrondissement, a fashionable section of Paris lying in the historic Marais district, said Morrison was

dead when a police ambulance arrived at the apartment.

A physician later issued a certificate attributing Morrison's death to a heart attack.

Bill Siddons, Morrison's manager in Los Angeles, said the rock idol had gone to Paris three months ago to live and write a book.

He said the initial news of Morrison's death was kept secret "to avoid the notoriety and circus-like atmosphere that surrounded the death of other rock personalities such as Janis Joplin and Jimi Hendrix."

Born in Melbourne, Fla., and a graduate of UCLA, Morrison and The Doors, based in Hollywood, rose to rock fame in 1967 with the release of an eventual million copy seller, "Light My Fire."

As a singer, Morrison was described by one rock critic as "cold, insolent, evil, slightly mad and seemed to be in some sort of hypnotic trance."

In Miami, Fla., in March, 1969, Morrison was accused of lewd and lascivious conduct for allegedly exposing himself before a huge crowd during a performance by The Doors. He (Cont. on Page 28, Col. 1)
