28 Students Gain Education Award

The awards are administered by an Educational Awards Council at the end of each semester. At the end of the school year cash awards are given to the outstanding seniors who have enrolled for the awards.

All other students who have re-

ceived awards during the school year are eligible to receive a scholarship pin.
