

Football Team Splits Last Two Games

First Win of Season

Before a mad, screaming and highly partisan group of students on October 28, our BHS Barons finally lived up to everyone's expectations by sloshing through the mud to a 12-6 upset win over Central High School from London. The game was an example of team effort all the way, as the Barons repeatedly "made their own breaks."

Central High jumped off to a 6-0 lead in the early moments of the first quarter after intercepting a Chuck Nielsen pass intended for Joey Butler.

It looked like another one of those days until the Barons started a drive in the waning moments of the first period with Steve Shwiff carrying the bulk of the load and finally hitting pay dirt on a spectacular 27 yard run. The conversion attempt failed, however, leaving the two teams deadlocked, 6-6.

That's the way it stood until the last quarter when the Barons, a well-known "last-quarter" ball club, just plainly outthrustled the Bushy Park eleven. The break came when Mike Batsel broke through the scrimmage line and smashed into the ballcarrier solidly enough to cause him to fumble, flipping the pigskin directly into the waiting hands of Butler, who was coming in on the play. Joey gathered the ball in and took off on a 47 yard jaunt down the sideline, outracing a host of Bushy Park defenders for the winning score.

A late Central rally was snuffed out abruptly when Kenny Evans knifed through the line and recovered a backfield fumble.

Although the victory was a tearful triumph, there were several players who were instrumental in the Bitburg win. Howard Peters and Joey Butler are to be commended for their strong line play. Jeff Fowler, who, in his first game playing end, caught a 15 yard pass which gave the Barons an important first down. Batsel and Shwiff starred in the backfield, along with Mike Riley, who made a key interception. Jack Williams did a lion's share of linebacking. Nielsen handled the kicking chores very well, getting

For the Barons Chuck Nielsen and Jack Williams sparkled on offense, while Joey Butler was clearly the stopper on defense with Williams, Dave Orr, and Mike Riley also making their share of tackles.
