# Stuttgart Cindermen **Victorious**

STUTTGART, Germany (Special) — A triple victory by Mike Porter led the host Stuttgart Stallions to an easy high school track win over Munich and Augsburg here Saturday.

Stuttgart captured nine of the 16 events in piling up 94 points, while Munich used its superior depth to top Augsburg, 51 to 26.

Porter captured the 120- and 180-yard hurdles events and the discus and added a second-place finish in the 100-meter run for the top performance of the day. Teammate Sid Seymour finished second in both the hurdles races, and then led a Stallion sweep of 40-4. He also ran a leg on the winning 800-meter relay team.

Other individual winners for Stuttgart were Riley Porter in the high jump, Mike Podurgal in the pole vault. Mike Anderson in the 1500, and Woody Peterson in the 3200.

Munich's Randy Wagner was the only other multiple winner, capturing both the 100 and 200 for two of the Mustangs' three

Johan Reynolds paced the Apaches' efforts with a victory in the 400 and ran the anchor leg on the 1600 relay team, while John Sturch in the shot put and Eddie Jordan in the 800 added the remainder of Augsburg's four firsts.
