

Frankfurt Triumphs in Northern Meet

Chase Sets USDESEA 3,200-Meter Record

WIESBADEN (Special) — Track conditions were ideal at Wiesbaden Saturday. And Northern Regional track and field competitors at Dyckerhoff Sports Platz took advantage of the situation and turned in one

USDESEA record, two Northern Regional marks and six best-of-1968 efforts. Kaiserslautern's Lloyd Chase shattered the USDESEA 3,200-meter mark to pieces with a brilliant 9:53.1 effort. His time cut

28 seconds off the record set only last year by Paris' Will Rogers in Western Regional competition. Chase's mark was also one of the two Northern Regional standards to fall by the wayside. The other was registered by Frank-

furt's 800-meter relay team. Chris Bradshaw, Bernie Smith, Ron Hall and Fred Collins churned the distance in 1:31.8. Wiesbaden accounted for three of the other four best performances of 1968 and Frankfurt

notched the fourth. Doug Jones won the 400-meter run in 50.2, the 1,600-meter Warrior relay team of Roger Goad, Mike Reid, Lloyd Letcher and Jim Randby was timed in 3:33.2 and the Warriors' Ted Wilkerson flipped the discus 135 feet, 6 inches. Frankfurt's Erik Thamm ran the 800 in 1:58.2.

Jones, an outstanding hurdler all season, had to forego his specialties because of a bad thigh that hampered his jumping. So he proved his versatility by winning at 200 meters in addition to his best-time run in the 400.

The Wiesbaden flash was one of four double winners in the meet.

Frankfurt won the team championship with 74 points. Wiesbaden followed with 68 and Kaiserslautern finished third with 44. Baumholder was fourth with 29. Berlin tallied 28, Bitburg followed with 12 and Bad Kreuznach had one point.

Stallions Take Southern Team Title; Seliquini Snaps Mark in Triple Jump

LUDWIGSBURG, Germany (Special) — Host Ludwigsburg High ran away with the Southern Regional track and field championships here Saturday as one regional record was broken, four tied and three USDESEA bests for the year were posted.

The defending Class A-champion Stallions' point total of 100½ was far ahead of runner-up Heidelberg, which had 48, while Munich got 40 points, Mannheim 25½, Karlsruhe 15, Wuerzburg 10, Augsburg nine and Nuernberg two. Karlsruhe is the defending Class B king-pin.

Munich's Jack Seliquini broke the only regional mark with a 41-8½ effort, in the triple jump, topping the old record by three-quarters of an inch. Upper Heyford's Ed Latimer had a 43-2 earlier in the year.

Southern records equaled were by Mike Porter of Ludwigsburg in the 180-yard high hurdles, 21.0; Phil Spottswood of Ludwigsburg with a 23.1 in the 200 meters; Greg Granderson of Augsburg with a 6-foot high jump, and Lance Sorenson of Ludwigsburg with 11-6 in the pole vault.

Better performances have been turned in by other prepsters some time this year.

Porter, however, did post a USDESEA best for 1968 in the 120 yard highs with a 15.4, topping the 15.5 by Wiesbaden's Doug Jones. Teammate Mike Ellis turned in the top 1,500 meters this season with a 4:16.4, beating his own previous best by 1.4 seconds.

Munich's Ed Holloway recorded the third 1968 best with a 11.0 in the 100 meters. Two relay times, by Ludwigsburg in the 800 (1:33.1) and Heidelberg in the 1,600 meters (3:36.1) would have been new '68 top marks, but Frankfurt's 800-meter team ran a 1:31.8 and Wiesbaden posted a 3:33.2 in the 1,600 meters, both in the Northern Regionals.

Top point getters for the Stallions, who garnered nine firsts in the 16 events, were Phil Spottswood, Ellis and Porter. Spottswood won the 200 me-

ters, was second in the 100 and ran a leg in Ludwigsburg's 800-meter relay. Porter won both hurdle events and Ellis, besides his 1,500 meters triumph, also took the 800 meters in 2:03.6.

Munich's Seliquini also was among the top point makers with his victory in the triple jump and seconds in the 100 and 200 meter dashes.

The top three finishers in each event automatically qualify for the USESEA meet Friday and Saturday at Nuernberg.

SCGA Race Grabbed By Nagel in Ford

CUMBERLAND, Md. (UPI)—Bob Nagel's McKee Ford, which spun out of the lead in the ninth lap, came back Sunday to finish 11-2 seconds ahead of the Howmett-X turbine car and set a new track record in the feature at the Sports Car Club of America's national races.

Nagel, of Bethel Park, Pa., trimmed the Cumberland track record to 1:07.6 in the featured "Vandergriff Memorial," for A and B sports racing. He averaged 80.3 miles per hour.

Ray Heppenstall's turbine car, the first ever entered in a sports car race, rounded the track in 1.08, also breaking the old record of 1:11.

Naples' Patterson Stars

5 ASIL Track Standards Fall

PISA, Italy (Special) — Derron Patterson of Naples won the 100 and 400 meters and placed second in the 200 to steal the individual thunder in the American Schools in Italy track meet here Saturday.

Five ASIL meet records were shattered and another tied in the meet, which was won by Notre Dame of Rome with 79 points. Naples finished second with 71, with Livorno (48), Vicenza (37) and Overseas of Rome (20) trailing.

Patterson broke the ASIL record with a 51.7 clocking in the 400 meters and tied the 100-meter mark with an 11.1 time. Other records were set by

Notre Dame's Shaun Tumpare in the 200 meters (22.2 in the prelims), Steve Sexton of Naples in the 800 meters (2:04.6), Richard Whitcomb of Naples in the 120-yard high hurdles (16.5) and Ed Cummings of Livorno in the 3,200 meters (10:36.7).

All winners, except those from Notre Dame, will advance to the USDESEA finals at Nuernberg, Germany, Friday and Saturday. Notre Dame is a member of the ASIL but is not a USDESEA school. Second-place finishers in all events won by Notre Dame will compete in Nuernberg.

Drake Appoints Karnes to Head Athletic Program

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI)—Track Coach Bob Karnes has been appointed athletic director at Drake University.

Karnes, who also has been director of the Drake Relays for the past 13 years, succeeds Jack McClelland, who resigned to become commissioner of the North Central Conference.

Drake President Dr. Paul F. Sharp said Karnes would continue as Relays director and as track coach, posts he has held since 1955. However, he was given assistance so he could take on the added work, Sharp said.

Paul Morrison, longtime business manager of athletics and sports information director, will be given added administrative duties to assist Karnes as athletic director. Gary Osborn, a former Drake track star, will become assistant track coach next fall.
